Those Shoes/Maribeth Boelts

Jeremy wants a pair of shoes that everyone at school seems to be wearing, but he can't afford them. When Jeremy's shoes fall apart at school, and the guidance

counselor gives him a hand-me-down pair, he is more determined than ever to have those shoes. Through a hard lesson, Jeremy comes to realize that the things he has are more important than the things he wants. (Picture Book BOE)



Maddi's Fridge/Lois Brandt

Best friends share secrets and help each other. One day after playing, Maddi and Sofia race to Maddi's house for a snack. Maddi is embarrassed her fridge is empty

and explains her mom can't afford food. She makes Sofia promise she won't tell anyone. Each night after dinner, Sofia packs food in her backpack for Maddi. Eventually Sofia realizes she must tell a grownup to help her friend. (Picture Book BRA)







The Name Jar/Yangsook Choi

Being the new kid in school is hard enough, but what about when your name is difficult to pronounce? On the way to school, Unhei is teased on the bus for her Korean name. Her classmates recommend American names, but eventually Unhei

chooses to keep her Korean name. (Picture Book Older CHO)



Last Stop on Market Street/Matt De La Pena

Every Sunday CJ and his grandma ride the bus across town. CJ wonders why they don't own a car; why doesn't he have an iPod? How come they always get off in the dirty part of town? Grandma answers each question with an encouraging


answer and helps CJ see the beauty and fun in the world around him. This book was the Newbery winner for 2016. (Picture Book DEL)

Andy and his family live in a small, rundown apartment that is never quite warm enough. He dreams of a house of his own. One Saturday, he notices people


beginning to work on boarded up houses. He learns that families who assist in the renovation are eligible to get a house of their own. Children are encouraged to feel empathy for Andy and his family as they strive to afford their own home.



The Spiffiest Giant in Town/Julia Donaldson

George wishes he wasn't the scruffiest giant in town. He buys himself a new set of clothes and looks forward to showing them off. However, when he meets animals in need of his assistance, George is only happy to help and knows that

being a good person is better than looking like one. A perfect lesson for all! (Picture Book DON)







How to Heal a Broken Wing/Bob Graham

In a city full of hurried people, Will is the only one who notices a bird with a broken wing. He takes it home and cares for it, hoping in time it will be able to return to the sky. In this book, the beauty is in the details: the bedroom filled with animal memorabilia; the saving of the single feather as a good-luck charm

<u>How Dalia Put a Big Yellow Comforter Inside a Tiny Blue</u> <u>Box: And Other Wonders of Tzedakah</u>/Linda Heller

When Dalia learns about tzedakah, the Jewish tradition of charity and caring, she creates a tzedakah box where she can keep the money she's saved to help those

in need. Dalia's story serves as a powerful reminder that the greatest joy of all comes from giving generously to others. (Picture Book HEL)



Chrysanthemum/Kevin Henkes

Chrysanthemum loves her name- it's absolutely perfect for her! But once she starts school, the other children make fun of it and Chrysanthemum goes home in tears. By chance, all the students love and adore their music teacher who also has


an unusual name—Delphinium, which sparks a new fad of flower names. (Picture Book HEN)


