


Asch, Frank. [Goodbye House](#)

Just before leaving with his family for the move to their new home, Little Bear says goodbye to all his favorite places in and around his old house. (PICTURE BOOK ASC)




Bagley, Jessixa. [Before I Leave](#)

Leaving her best friend is difficult for a young hedgehog whose family is moving, but everyone assures her that things will be alright. (PICTURE BOOK BAG)




Bond, Rebecca. [When Marcus Moore Moved In](#)

Marcus is lonely on his first day in the new neighborhood, but then he makes a good friend. (PICTURE BOOK BON)




Bottner, Barbara. [Rosa's Room](#)

Libbie gives a tour of her neighborhood to a boy just about her age whose family is moving in next door. (PICTURE BOOK BUL)




Carlson, Nancy. [My Best Friend Moved Away](#)


Crum, Shutta. [A Family for Old Mill Farm](#)


Denise, Anika. [Bella and Stella Come Home](#)

A little girl tries to reassure her favorite doll when they move to a new, and very different, home. (PICTURE BOOK DEN)




Golembe, Carla. [Annabelle's Big Move](#)

An apple tree helps two children settle into their new home. (PICTURE BOOK HOU)





Frank the coyote is sad when his friend Angelina moves away, but then he finds a new friend when Larry moves into the den next door. (PICTURE BOOK LUN)




Macomber, Debbie & Mary Lou Carney. [The Yippy, Yappy Yorkie in the Green Doggy Sweater](#)



When Amy and her family move into a new house, it takes some effort to make it feel like home. (PICTURE BOOK MAI)




Maturana, Andrea. [Life Without Nico](#)




A young boy uses his imagination to pretend he is a spaceboy to help him cope with the move to his new home. (PICTURE BOOK SMI)




Underwood, Deborah. [Bad Bye, Good Bye](#)

Ira is surprised to discover that his best friend Reggie feels happy about having to move to a new town. (PICTURE BOOK WAB)



Tim and his stuffed animal are nervous about moving, but soon realize making new friends can be a good thing. (PICTURE BOOK WAG)







Freddy learns that while it takes some time, there are friends for him in his new neighborhood. (EARLY READER HOF)




Krensky, Stephen. [We Just Moved!](#)


Lagonegro, Melissa. [Journey Into the Mind](#)

When Henry's cousin Annie prepares to move in next door he and Mudge help calm her fears. (EARLY READER RYL)






Arnold, Elana K. [Far From Fair](#)


Banks, Kate & Rupert Sheldrake. [Boy's Best Friend](#)


Cassidy, Sara. [Not For Sale](#)



Now that Amber's mom and Max are married, the family is moving to a new house, and Amber is worried about more than just packing. How can she leave the only home she's ever known? (J DAN)





The year she is in the third grade is a sad time for Amber because her best friend Justin is getting ready to move to a distant state. (J DAN)





Twelve-year-old best friends Elizabeth and Tara-Starr continue their friendship through letter-writing after Tara-Starr's family moves to another state. (J DAN)







Twelve-year-old Anastasia is horrified at her family's decision to move from their city apartment to a house in the suburbs. (J LOW)




Marcionette, Jake. [Just Jake](#)


Margolis, Leslie. [Boys Are Dogs](#)


Smith, Anne Warren. [Bittersweet Summer](#)




